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MANAGER'S REPORT

GUEST POLICY The community facilities are a great location to bring your friends and family for fun and relaxation. Please remember it is your responsibility to sign your guests in at the front desk. As the sponsoring resident you must remain with your guests at all times. Thank you for your cooperation.

NEIGHBORLY NOTE It has been noted that cars and trucks are parking in a way that is obstructing the community sidewalks. Many people are not pulling up fully to the garage which is causing bumpers, hitches, and sometimes half of the vehicle to block the sidewalks. This requires pedestrians to step into the street, causing an unsafe situation.

OPEN HOUSE SIGNS For those homeowners that will be holding an open house please remind your sales agent that only one open house and one directional sign may be placed in the common area with prior notification to the management office. At this time, signs may not be placed in the traffic circles. Flyers that include directions may be left with the gate attendant for distribution to prospective buyers.

COMMUNITY WALKERS During the month of June we have had two separate incidents where vehicles have veered off of Four Seasons Circle and hit an irrigation box, trees, and a fire hydrant. For your safety we ask that you walk on the sidewalk and be visible and vigilant at all times.

HOMEOWNER SUGGESTIONS For the last six months or so the homeowner suggestions have gained popularity and increased the size of the report substantially. Due to the size restrictions for the *Breeze* we will be moving the document to the website.

Eric Zarr and I have reviewed the homeowner suggestion report and have decided to update the format to ensure that we are providing a comprehensive document and complete information. We will be providing more information and updates as they become available.

DOLLARS & SENSE At the June 9 Board of Directors meeting, the Board approved the following expenses:

- Common area and front yard cost center tree trimming (Brad Alms area): \$86,970
- Annual color installation: \$3,300
- Rock installation around Summit spa pool: \$3,325
- Springdale bench concrete pad installation: \$1,500

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SPECIAL ELECTION

Five residents have filed to run for two positions on the HOA Board in a special election to be completed Aug. 3.

Those running are Jeanne Glanville, Dennis Gray, John Noonan, Jerry Monahan and Fred Weck.

The Board seats became open under provisions of the CC&Rs that reduce the number of seats held by builder K. Hovnanian Homes. For 10 years after the first close of escrow the builder appointed four directors; now that number is limited to two.

The new members will give homeowners a majority on the seven-member Board for the first time. K Hovnanian will retain two seats until build-out. The two new members will join incumbent President Len Tavernetti, Vice President Clauden Diaz and Secretary Jean Sandoval.

Because the deadline to file for election was June 24, there may be more candidates who filed after the Breeze deadline of June 10.

A "Meet the Candidates" night was held in the Ballroom on June 29 to allow voters to become acquainted with the homeowners on the ballot. Immediately after that election packets were mailed to homeowners. Each household has one vote.

The ballots will be counted by Inspectors of Election on Aug. 2 with the final tally announced at a special meeting on Aug. 3.

The final vote may not be known until the special meeting because of the District Delegate system required by the CC&Rs. The delegates act much like members of the Electoral College in U.S. Presidential elections – with an important difference. Unless a majority of households in a district vote, that district's delegate casts all the district's voting power as he or she sees fit. It is quite possible a single delegate can decide an election unless all districts reach quorum.

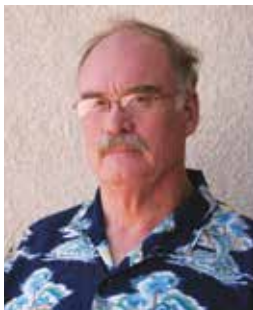

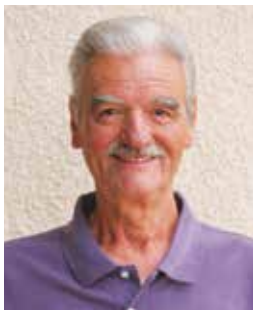

“war” in this community. I lived through Board wars for five years in my last community and it did nothing but tear the community apart. Friend versus friend and neighbor versus neighbor and it got very ugly.

During that time I was asked to run for the Board and bring the community back together. I spent six years as President of the Association working to undo all of the harm that the past Boards had created, and built a foundation for future Boards to build upon. It was a community of 350 homes and as one of the five Board Members we were the Finance, Architectural, Landscape, Rules and Regulation Committee members. I attended 11 Euclid Management’s Legal HOA BOD seminars on the running of HOAs. From these seminars I learned that it does not take a genius to be a good Board member, but it does take a lot of common sense and the willingness and ability to listen to others. The Operating Manual is already written out for you in the CC&Rs, Rules and Regulations and in the Davis-Stirling Act.

I keep hearing that we need “change” and when I ask what needs to be changed I never get an answer. What this community needs is a strong foundation that can be built upon, not be changed. With a good foundation we can have consistency from Board to

Board. In an HOA a good foundation has to start with a strong financial foundation. This community is very lucky to have such a knowledgeable and wonderful Finance Committee. The most important facet of the HOA financials is the HOA’s Reserves which our Finance Committee understands and firmly believes in. There will be a time in this community when we will not have the luxury of new money coming in from new home sales. Our HOA bills will continue to increase. Repairs, such as street repaving, will start to add up. The more we have in the reserve the more money we will have to cover these increases without raising dues. Board members have to use their common sense to prepare for the future at least 10 years out.

Board members have to remember that they work for the community and don’t rule the community. Board members do the work of the community so the members can enjoy the community without worrying about today, tomorrow, or the future. Just remember that we are all here to enjoy the remaining years of our lives. So let’s just all work together, preserve our friendships in the community and have lots of fun.

Please list any experience or reasons why you feel you would make a good Board member:

I actively encourage residents who are interested to participate in our community’s governance. For example, I served as the Landscape Committee chairman for two years (April 2008-April 2010) before voluntarily stepping down to let another newer member be the chair. By contrast, after her one year term, the very next chairman kept the chairman position for nearly five years. I stayed on the committee as recording secretary only long enough until a replacement committee member volunteered to take and type up the minutes.

As district delegate in the last election, I worked hard to raise the voter participation rate up to 70 percent.

My leadership style is collaborative, not combative. I prefer to build consensus within the team (whether it’s a Board or Committee) and keep all the members informed, where every member has an equal voice.

Community Association experience within Four Seasons Beaumont:

As Landscape Committee chairperson, I planned, organized, and led the first ever Four Seasons Beaumont Town Hall meeting in June 2009, attended by over 160 residents. I instituted monthly ‘landscape walks’ with the landscape maintenance contractor and committee members to see landscape issues up front and identify corrective measures. I personally researched, then published, a list of attractive but drought tolerant plants suitable for our residents to plant at their homes and had it put on our web page. After numerous inspection walks, I wrote the proposal to the HOA Board for upgrading the poor quality landscaping in the Springdales. I led a January 2011 town hall meeting of Springdale residents, solicited their inputs, listened to their concerns, addressed their concerns, and interviewed landscape architects, worked with the landscape architect and landscape installation contractor to manage the largest project ever accomplished in our HOA up to that time.

I have been on the Emergency Preparedness Committee since

2013, and currently serve as one of three Co-Chairs since September of 2015. I helped plan and organize two ‘table top’ disaster drill exercises by writing the disaster scenario, and had an active role during the exercises. I made arrangements for logistic support of the participating members and helped take down the exercise equipment and supplies afterward. I have completed the 20-hour Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training program given by our City. I planned, organized and conducted training of the response team responsible for safely removing injured residents from damaged dwellings. I have earned my Ham radio license with the FCC and participate in the weekly test of our Four Seasons emergency radio communication system. I planned, organized, directed, and led the largest Town Hall meeting ever conducted within our HOA, attended by 300 persons in January, 2016, aimed at preparing for disasters including earthquakes and any predicted El Niño rain storms.

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OBSERVATIONS FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT

Thousands of years ago shepherds (Board members) learned the best way to protect their assets (sheep) was to engage watchdogs (homeowners) to keep vigilance over their flocks. Today, this lesson is still most relevant, especially with government entities that are responsible for the assets of the voters. While we often think of reporters as watchdogs, the fact that they service both the watched and the watchers conflicts their contributions. The most valuable and dedicated watchdogs are the voters themselves who have the maximum interest in safeguarding their own assets.

To be most effective these voter watchdogs need access to the information that leads to decisions by their elected council or board members. It is impossible, if not impractical, to attend every committee meeting, very few of us have the time, the dedication and the patience for such a crusade. This leaves participation in council or board meetings, either in person or via the Internet, as the likely

source of information. However, passive participation requires their elected officials assist the watchdogs by constantly questioning the facts and issues that precede recommendations up for discussion.

To this end at Four Seasons our Board members will question committee chair persons about proposals, even if we already know the details. This allows the watchdogs to follow the logic trail of the decision process. Neither our Board nor our committees have a monopoly on great ideas. We have many residents who acquired business and professional experience over a lifetime that may spot or suspect unexpected results, more efficient solutions or technology advancements that could change our course of action. But, the watchdogs need to see and hear what is happening and the shepherds need to help them do this.

We recognize that this may lengthen the meeting time. We do have a pool of homeowners who are willing to make this time sacrifice and we will continue to meet their needs.

Chef's Corner

Total Time: 55 min.
Yield: 8-12 servings

Mixed Berry Cobbler with Orange-Scented Biscuits

Making a cobbler isn't difficult. Just start with fresh seasonal fruit, such as berries, and complement it with a topping. In this case the topping is cream biscuit dough flavored with orange zest that combined with the berries produces a flavorful dessert.

DIRECTIONS

1. Heat oven to 375°. Lightly butter an 8-inch-square baking dish.
2. In a food processor bowl, pulse together the flour, 2 tablespoons sugar, baking powder, salt and orange zest. Add the cold cubed butter and pulse together just until the mixture has the texture of lightly moistened cornmeal. There may be a few pea-sized chunks of butter remaining — that's fine.
3. Pour over heavy cream and then pulse 4 to 6 times just to moisten the dough. Do not over-mix or the dough will be tough.
4. In a bowl, toss together the blackberries, raspberries, one-fourth cup sugar and cornstarch to coat lightly. Add the orange juice and stir gently to moisten.
5. Spoon the fruit into the prepared baking dish and then use 2 spoons to scatter generous 1 to 2 tablespoon clumps of the dough over the top, covering the berries nearly completely. Bake until the topping is puffed and golden and the berries have turned jammy and fragrant, about 45 minutes.



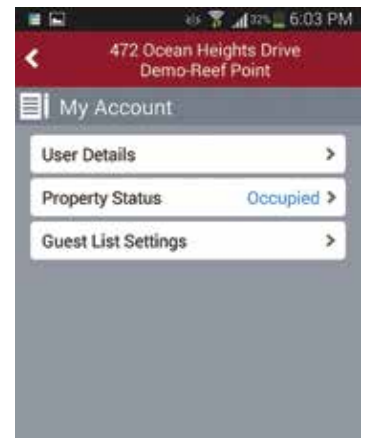
INGREDIENTS

1 1/2 cups flour
1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons sugar, divided
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 teaspoons orange zest
1/4 cup butter, cold and cubed, plus more for buttering dish
2/3 cup heavy cream
1 1/2 pounds blackberries and raspberries
2 teaspoons cornstarch
2 tablespoons orange juice

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DID YOU KNOW?

DID YOU KNOW THAT JULY 12 IS ETCH-A-SKETCH DAY? Do you remember Etch-A-Sketch? If you spent many happy hours drawing pictures on the screen then magically removing them, you'll relish the opportunity to relive your childhood on Etch-A-Sketch day. The Etch-A-Sketch toys are still readily available, so it's a chance to invest in one and get sketching. If you prefer, taking time to do any sort of drawing or painting will be a good way of marking Etch-a-sketch day. This day is all about creativity, so undertaking anything which involves a pencil, pen or brush is appropriate. With so many choices for having fun while also creating something original and wonderful, it's no wonder that Etch-A-Sketch Day is so widely celebrated.

DID YOU KNOW THAT JULY 19 IS DAIQUIRI DAY? Need a way to cool off? Why not celebrate Daiquiri Day! This refreshing drink was invented in the early 1900s in the small mining town of Daiquiri near Santiago, Cuba by an engineer named Jennings Stockton Cox. Cox came up with his daiquiri concoction in an effort to cool down during the summer months. His recipe was a simple blend of lime juice, sugar and local Bacardi rum over cracked ice. He found daiquiris to be the best way to boost the morale of the mine workers during the hot months. Such was the success of Cox's drink that not only did he receive a generous stipend from the company, he also received a monthly gallon of Bacardi to continue supplying the refreshing drink!

DID YOU KNOW THAT JULY 27 IS SCOTCH WHISKEY DAY? The Babylonians of Mesopotamia were likely the first people to distill alcohol in the second millennium BC. At the time it is likely that various perfumes and aromatics were most often distilled. The earliest records of the distillation of alcohol for the purpose of drinking date back to 13th century Italy, where harder alcohols were distilled from wine. Soon the practice of distillation spread through medieval monasteries and was used largely for medicinal purposes. Distillation spread to Great Britain in the 15th century, and the first evidence of whiskey production in Scotland comes from an entry in the Exchequer Rolls for 1494 where malt was sent "To Friar John Cor, by order of the king, to make aquavit," enough for about 500 bottles. Whiskey production later moved out of a monastic setting and into personal homes and farms when King Henry VIII of England dissolved all the monasteries in his country due to his feud with the Pope. The distillation process in those days was much more basic than it is today. The whiskey itself was not allowed to age, meaning it must have tasted much more raw than it does today. There are hundreds of distilleries in Scotland you have likely never heard of that make whiskey better than you've ever tried before, and this day is the day to experience them.

DID YOU KNOW THAT JULY 13 IS FRENCH FRIES DAY? The name "French Fries" is misleading, as the origins of this fried food seem to be in Belgium. The story of their creation can be found in a family manuscript dated 1781, which reveals that potatoes were originally cut into the shape of fish and served in lieu of the fish normally caught in a series of small villages in Belgium. It seems the river had frozen over and the fish they normally caught and fried were unable to be caught. Why they're called French is often attributed to troops coming over during WWI who got their hands on Belgian Fries. The official language of the Belgian army at that time was French, and as a result the men thought they were in France rather than Belgium. Interestingly, in that region of the world, they are still called "Flemish Fries" to further complicate matters. Now these treats are loved the world round, even becoming the national snack of the Netherlands.

Mess Hall Escapee Graces Four Seasons Stage

On October 28 this year, the Four Seasons Performing Arts Club will present *Love and Marriage*. The show was written by and will be produced and directed by Four Seasons resident Michael Rothberg.

He got in to “show biz” not by years and years of studying and practicing and performing, from a very young age. No. He just wanted to escape Army mess halls.

“When you join the military they give you a battery of tests so that they can make the best use of your skills for the betterment of the Army. They told me I had the highest score ever on the Army language aptitude test. I was thinking — all right! Army Language School! The Presidio of Monterrey!

“They made me a cook.

“Eight weeks at Fort Ord: Up at 3 every day; clean, scrub, cook, scrub, clean, cook. They cook by the recipe. One recipe is for 100 men. If have 123 men, you cook 1.23 recipes. I became very disenchanted with the Army.”

Just prior to the Army, Rothberg had spent about six months

in Spain studying flamenco guitar. He also traveled to France and Germany and very much liked Europe. “I just wanted to go back to Germany so I joined the Army,” he said.

“They graciously assigned me, as a cook, to an Army Engineer base in Butzbach. To compound my misery I arrived there in January during the coldest winter in 100 years.”

But some unseen force was looking out for Rothberg. Due to the fluke chance that he took typing in junior high school and that the Signal Corps S3 clerk on the base was rotating back to the U.S., Rothberg became the temporary S3 clerk. “A temporary reprieve.”

Then came the All Army Entertainment Contest. “It was kind of like America’s Got Talent,” he said, “a contest throughout the entire Army. Level 1 starting with each base, then area, region, etc... up to the finals.

He entered the first level (One never knows when cooking might rear it’s head).

“How many other flamenco guitarists could there be in Butzbach?” he asked. “I won, of course.”

He lost at the very next level and would have gone back to cooking but, in another fluke of good luck, one of the producers of the contest was an acquaintance from Rothberg's earlier trip to Europe – and he needed help.

"I got 90 days temporary duty with the contest. I did lighting scenery and sound, writing — everybody was doing everything."

After that he scored similar temporary duty at Frankfurt Playhouse that put on shows to entertain GIs (*South Pacific*, *Little Mary Sunshine*), then another, smaller Army theater in Heidelberg and then with the 7th Army Soldiers Chorus as a performer — both a singer and guitarist.

"The chorus really had some talented people," he said. "There were 40 singers. We performed throughout Germany and France — made an album," all the while he continued his show business education, but, in a situation familiar to every soldier, he ran afoul of the lieutenant in charge of the chorus.

"He didn't like my attitude (which was reciprocated) and he kicked me out of the chorus and had me assigned — as a COOK — to his old Quartermaster outfit."

When he got to the new unit, the company clerk was rotating out and Rothberg's typing skills came in handy: he became the clerk and never cooked again.

For the next year he continued playing guitar and performing and soon teamed up with an Army buddy, Mike Pevzner and Barb Goldberg, the daughter of a civilian Army employee. They became popular with other GIs and German civilians.

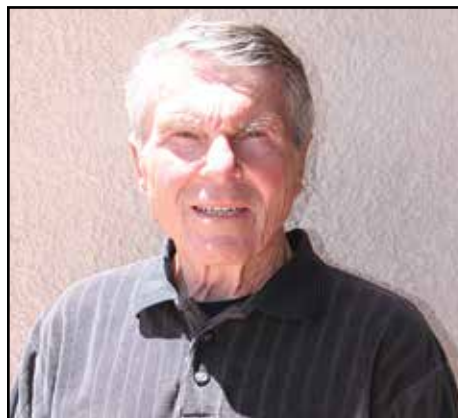
"We had regular gigs at German clubs in Heidelberg and service clubs. We also played a command performance at the retirement ceremony for General Creighton Abrams. It was a great thrill for us."

"If it hadn't been for the threat hanging over my head of being an Army cook, I don't think I would have ventured into performing arts."

On top of that, he says, "it gave me self confidence... not to be afraid to try things that I might fail at."

Michael and his wife, Dianne, have been residents at Four Seasons for over five years. They moved here after about 11 years at Sun Lakes. "We love it here," he said.

In addition to his work with the Performing Arts Club, he is a member of the Ad Hoc Technical Committee and the Amphitheater Committee. He was an avid tennis player for over 50 years but now his love is Paddle Tennis.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

We met on May 31. The financial statements were reviewed for the month of April, which reflected the following significant amounts:

Total assets \$7,649,103 including checking \$475,491 and reserve assets \$5,418,161. Money market and CDs totaled \$1,664,940. Total liabilities were \$297,112 and total equity of \$1,933,830. Net income for the month is \$41,541 and year to date \$113,049. Front yard cost center expenses were under budget by \$4,928 and Springdale cost center expenses were under budget by \$292.

Excess operating funds of \$400,000 were recommended to be invested in short term CDs, and numerous existing Reserve CDs were recommended to be reinvested in short term CDs.

Five vendor proposals were recommended for Board approval. Five homeowners and Board President Len Tavernetti, were present as guests. Chairman Noel Meyers resigned his position, but will remain on the committee. Don Fant was nominated to be next years chairman pending Board ratification. The committee wishes to thank Noel Meyers for his outstanding leadership and service for the past three years. One opening exists on the committee with two applications in process.

RULES & REGULATIONS COMMITTEE

We have had standing room only at the last few committee meetings. Some of the resident's concerns were:

1. Reducing the cost of homeowner mailings. J. Mupo reported the cost of obtaining a Business Mail Permit would be nearly double what we are paying now as Four Seasons does not have sufficient volume of pre-paid mail.
2. More open time is needed for non-club billiard play. Activity Director Cindy Graves is currently working on a solution.
3. The Term Limits Group requested an update to the group's initial suggestion of term limits for committee members. Additional time is required for review as only one committee responded to the March 31 email requesting input.

Should you need a temporary structure (tents, sun shades, jumpers) erected for a gathering at your home, you will need to complete form 2097 for approval. Forms are available at the Lodge's front desk.

What's the rush? Speed limit on Four Seasons Circle is 30 mph and on other streets the speed limit is 25 mph. Use your turn signals and slow down. Beaumont police have the authority to issue violations.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS COMMITTEE

“A Midsummer Night’s Dream... or Nightmare?”

You are awakened by a jolt. You turn on your water faucet and the water is cloudy or chocolate brown color. Don’t drink it! There has been damage to a water line supplying your home. The HOA does not have a hidden water well or emergency water tank. Hopefully, you are prepared with a minimum of three gallons per person per day for cooking and drinking. Three of the blue seven-gallon containers would take care of one person for a week. Water has a definite shelf life: six months if you fill your own containers and one year if it’s store bought.

Your stomach is growling and your body wants to recycle the Mexican food from taco Tuesday. You receive a reverse 911 phone call telling you that there has been a sewer line break in your neighborhood. You quickly realize that this is no problem as all you really have to do is to drain the water from your toilet and line your toilet bowl with a heavy duty trash bag. This will allow you to use



it a couple of times until it is filled. Then you will pull it out and replace it. Then set the bag in an extra 10 gallon trash can that you have set aside for this purpose. If you are the outdoor type you can use a sturdy five gallon plastic bucket with a seat and bag liners. Don’t forget toilet tissue, alcohol hand sanitizer and baby fresh wipes. All of these items will aid in our cleanliness and comfort.

It is not necessarily true that storing water takes up a lot of space. Your needs can be met by a variety of different sized water containers (everything from 20 oz. water bottles to 55 gallon blue plastic drums. The choice is yours, but just know that the 55 gallon drum will require a pump of some type to extract the water.

I awaken startled and it seems like it has all been a dream. The land-locked “Love Boat” known as Four Seasons Beaumont is still afloat. SAFETY & FACILITIES COMMITTEE

On June 7, the Safety and Facilities Committee met to cover numerous items.

We discussed and forwarded the following agenda items to Finance for approval then forwarded to the Board of Directors for approval and action: Lodge re-lamping proposal, changes to Bocce and Horseshoe Courts, replacement of Community Gazebos, Spa building audio upgrade, gate lock for Summit maintenance gate, upgrade portable projector, furnace and air conditioning in third section of Ballroom repair, security desk replacement at main gate, hard wire and install automate door opening for exit door at Summit (opens too slow), and mailbox repairs (keys for parcel doors).

The Committee discussed for further research the following: signs at main entry gate, new chairs for RCN (still testing color and size), renovation of RCN fountain (to be reconstructed as a non-water piece), computer room tallying report for usage, lighting the area between Lodge and Spa buildings, UV lighting (Summit only) and automated systems for all pools, homeowner request for recycle

bins, tint soffit windows in RCN (too much white light in the area), reupholster Card Room chairs, and research for ADA door and ADA switch for exit doors at Lodge.

The Committee has finished or ordered: Furnishings for Summit Spa area, replacement of outdoor pool umbrellas, sound Boards for RCN rooms (almost completed, additional materials en route), hot water to sinks at the Summit, rolling umbrella strands, drapery cleaning machine (can also be used to clean chairs in Bistro), Ballroom ceiling repair scheduled for vendor repair, Lodge Pool chair replacement, viewing wall in Craft Room, Ballroom clock placement, Card Room door shades, mats and benches for ADA Summit stalls, audio boxes in Exercise Room, replacement of sign at the Summit (plants block the sign).

Hypericum perforatum, also known as St. John's wort

LANDSCAPE COMMITTEE

Hypericum perforatum, also known as St. John's wort, is a flowering plant in the family Hypericaceae.

The common name "St. John's wort" may be used to refer to any species of the genus *Hypericum*.

This plant has replaced the old, woody-appearing myoporum at the Lodge north parking lot.

The common name "St. John's wort" comes from its traditional flowering and harvesting on St. John's Day, June 24. The genus name *Hypericum* is derived from the Greek words *hyper* (above) and *eikon* (picture), in reference to the tradition of hanging plants over religious symbols in the home during St. John's Day, to ward off evil.

The leaves are yellow-green in color, with scattered light, translucent dots. When held up to the light, the dots give the leaves

the perforated appearance to which the plant's Latin name refers. The flowers appear between late spring and early to mid summer. When flower buds or seed pods are crushed, a reddish/purple liquid is produced.

St. John's wort thrives in areas with either a winter or summer dominant rainfall. It is ideally suited for use as a ground cover in many different types of soil. In addition to its versatility, its beautiful green foliage provides the perfect background for its bright, clear yellow flowers held close to the leaves in summer.

As an evergreen in warm winter climates it usually dies to the ground or suffers some tip dieback in cold winter climates and comes back each spring. ~ **Nancy Justice**

ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW COMMITTEE

To have your plans reviewed in a timely manner, please submit them to FirstService Management Office by noon on the Monday prior to the Wednesday meeting or sooner. Remember to include pictures of your property to help us with the review process.

The initial application must be submitted within four months from close of escrow date and the work must be completed eight months from close of escrow date.

Addendums/Amendments work must be complete within four months of approval.

Decisions of the ARC and the reasons for them shall be mailed to the applicant within 30 days after receipt by the ARC of all materials required by the ARC. (The ARC does not give verbal approvals). No work shall begin or materials deposited at site prior to owner receiving written approval.

After completion, owner to submit a written Notice of Completion, Exhibit "C" with photos of the work. Approval/disapproval letters will be sent after inspection.

For a more thorough explanation of the submittal/approval/inspection process see the Community Guidelines, part four, Architectural Guidelines and Standards. Watch for the new revised edition of the Architectural Guidelines coming in the mail.

Note that outdoor yard and wall art, statuary, potted plants, and lighting proposed for the front yard area must be noted on the property improvement application and approved by ARC.

Our trip back was delightful with all the banter of people who knew each other even better as a result of the trip. We were met at Walmart by our Dial-A-Ride which took us back to Four Seasons and to my front door. These bus drivers are helpful, knowledgeable and courteous.

We have put a sign-up sheet down in the Lodge for future trips. We will re-run the one to Morongo for a while before trying another destination. The purpose of these trips is to educate seniors about using the bus transportation available in Beaumont and to get comfortable with getting on and off, particularly using a scooter, wheelchair, cane or walker.

At our June 1 meeting in the Lodge with Mario Janesin of the Riverside Community Access Center, we discussed our trip and the taxicab services of Lyft and Uber. We found out using Lyft is cheaper than Uber. We do have some service in our Beaumont area and are working on gathering more information on service and prices. Lyft, I am told provides services any time of night.

In June at a meeting of the T-Now Committee, I proposed we could use more people manning the phone lines for Beaumont Dial-A-Ride and Pass Transit. I suggested using volunteers and ask any

of you to call me if you would be interested in helping to man the transportation lines for Beaumont. I am going to propose that for every certain amount of hours spent volunteering to answer phones perhaps Beaumont could give out some free bus passes.

We are still working on our questionnaire at the Lodge and online. The ones we have received so far have been a big help. What has come out of this is that of the 35 to 75 age group, 31 percent live alone certainly a large enough group to need and want better, economical and efficient transportation to medical facilities, shopping, food, drugstores, etc. Please keep filling out these questionnaires in the Lodge and online at www.surveymonkey.com/r/passtransitseniors.

I would like people to start emailing me at brendarteeman@verizon.net regarding our Transportation for Seniors articles, questions or any proposals on senior transportation, Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), transportation or veteran transportation. Any questions and interest shown would be greatly appreciated.

Just a note about ADA: if you feel you qualify, get forms online or call Riverside Transit. Many of you may qualify and all it takes is to fill out a form and have your doctor fill out a form. You may have had knee surgery, use a scooter, wheelchair, cane or walker and easily qualify. This gives you many perks such as avoiding the fixed route buses and using Dial-A-Ride door-to-door. For those calling for a Sunday Dial-A-Ride, please be sure to call City Hall Transportation, Beaumont by Thursday. Thursday is the deadline for scheduling Sunday Dial-A-Ride. 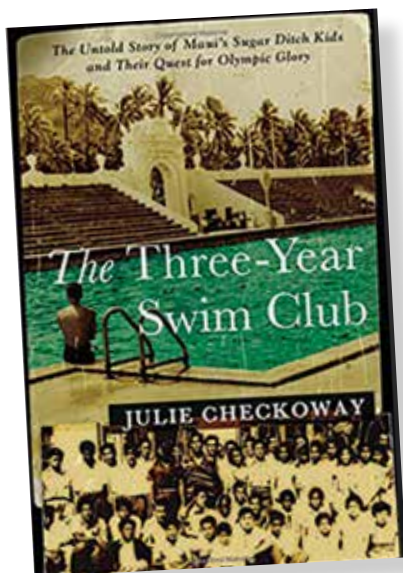
Prior to retiring and moving to the Four Seasons two years ago I lived in Orange. I was busy with other endeavors and had not drawn for many years.

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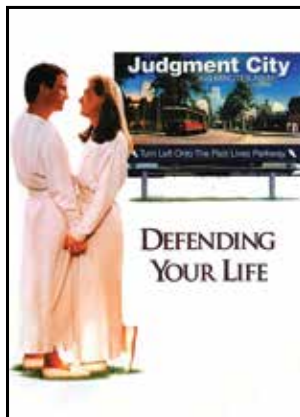
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COUNTER CULTURE CINEMA

The Dog Owners Group continues to grow at Four Seasons.

Our twice weekly “pack walks” have proven to be very popular. We meet every Wednesday evening at 6 pm at the Summit parking lot and every Saturday morning at 8 am in the parking lot in front of the Fitness Center.

Walks last about 30 to 45 minutes on both sidewalks and the trail system. Everyone is welcome. Experienced dog obedience handlers are present to assist in integrating dogs who have never experienced a “pack walk.” Retractable leashes are not permitted. You must bring a line leash not greater than six feet. Even the most inexperienced dog usually settles into the fun of a pack walk within 10 minutes. Dogs of all sizes are welcome. Even those who don’t currently have a dog are welcome to join us on our walks. Join us and have some fun.

The Dog Owners Group wants to express how important it is to pick up after your dog, whether along the sidewalk or on the trail system. According to statistics, 40 percent of Americans do not

pick up after their dog. It is estimated that at Four Seasons, only 10 percent don’t pick up after their dog. That is pretty good, but not good enough. We need to encourage 100 percent of dog owners to pick up after their dog at Four Seasons. Why is this important? According to the EPA, dog waste is as toxic to the environment as chemical and oil spills. Dog waste carries dangerous pathogens and pollutes our freshwater supply through rain and humidity. Decomposition begins as soon as dog waste hits the ground in your yard and along paths and sidewalks and toxic bacteria seeps into the soil and dangerous pathogens pollute our ground water supply. Generally, municipal waste water systems are not designed to filter dog waste. Always bag and trash your dog waste — even when no one is watching! Never forget to carry a bag again!

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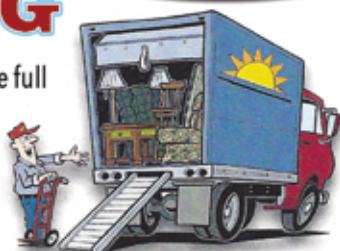

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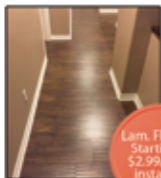
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
